Be Still and Know I Am God Quiet Day

We were still, quiet... and eventually wet. 10 souls gathered on Saturday the 14th for a beautiful time of wandering and wondering in God's Little Acre that is Christ Church Pioneer Chapel at Tingalpa. The crew wasn't put off by the threat of rain for a morning that started with a Celtic inspired morning prayer then a time of mooching about guided by the invitation that wasting time with God is a precious gift.

Our reflection booklet suggested "Today you don't have to do anything... you can sit in a shady space, snooze, cogitate whatever comes into mind... sing to yourself, wander, wonder... there's no rules other than give others the space and quiet to be too. "

Folk took this to heart as they walked and paused and noticed. Fr Sam encouraged us to hold each other in prayer with a gentle exercise in selecting a named ball to carry with us through the morning to focus some loving energy.

As always the shared morning tea was abundant and the connection conversation warm. Lucky as the storm clouds gathered. We set off on a pilgrimage walk with 8 stations focused on the advent journey... despite attempting to keep going under umbrellas, the downpour defeated us and we had to hastily retreat to shelter... but we were safe and dry and the simple sharing of Eucharist closed the day and fed the soul. The Be Still prayer we shared is below and might help you when you need a moment.

St Patrick's prayer comes from Psalm 46:10 of the Hebrew Scriptures: **"Be** still and know that I am God." Use this prayer to try and draw yourself and others into a contemplative frame of mind.

Be still and know that I am God. Be still and know that I am. Be still and know. Be still. Be.

Find a quiet place, gently close your eyes and take a few deep breaths.
Prepare to pray the Psalm in 5 consecutively diminishing sentences.
Either aloud or quietly to yourself, say the words, "Be still and know that I am God."

While Shepherd's washed their socks at night... or something like that. I'm not too annoyed by repetitious Christmas music just yet... but that's with three Christmas services ahead and a far bit of festive pfaffing to sort out, so who knows how I'll be by Boxing Day.

Advent and the lead up to Christmas are weird times. I spoke the other day about *the 'Brood of Vipers"* and *"Rejoice you goodly people"* paradox of our scripture choices in the lead up to The Big Event and the challenge of balancing quiet reflection with letting the good times roll in our hot and humid subtropics.

In some ways, I've found all of that a useful distraction from the yuckness of a lot of what folk are feeling and experiencing in news of the world and struggles just to keep their head above water. I've done a funeral and a couple of end of life visits and I know some folk are trying to stay positive when memories of loss of those they love surface. Grief is real in so many ways.

I think our special calling this year is actually the same as any year... to keep the fragile, shy glimmer of hope alive, even when things can seem so dark. It's why I appreciate the effort that goes into lights on houses, trees and in dancing reindeer antlers. The lights are an act of defiance in the face of gloom. We don't have the early twilight or deep cold of the North but our show of light still means a lot more than we realise.

So when you drive around, notice and appreciate. Lots of folk who light up possibly don't have an awareness of the profound act in turning on Christmas lights but I like to think something remains in the cultural memory of a star above a manger and the glow of glory of choirs of angels. May you hold onto your
