Tales of Cyclone Tracy-a Faith Adventure

24 February 2024 was Declaration Sunday for ISEE Church... my former church. Senior Pastor Paul Geering challenged the entire congregation to participate in a Faith Adventure during 2024. His sermon is on YouTube under ISEE Church and well worth watching.

Shortly after I was advised of The Remembering Cyclone Tracy Celebration. I immediately advised my desire to attend and booked my flights commencing my

2024 Faith Adventure. As the year unfolded excellent accommodation was booked, health challenges began to resolve, and I was able to move into EM Tooth. All apparent travel concerns and attending official events were all resolved according to our Lord's plan. Many fellow Tracy survivors were staying at the same hotel as me and I met many more at the official functions. I met my now good friend Cindy Eggington, her father had been my mentor at Water Resources pre Tracy.



I was 27 at the time and she was 8 and evacuated like my wife and children. There were 2 Tales of Tracy events which were very moving. The most memorable event was the unveiling of the official Cyclone Tracy Memorial at dawn (corresponding to dawn Christmas Day 1974 when us survivors were emerging to see the atomic blast like destruction) by the Governor General and the Prime Minister.

After the crowds dispersed we could view the memorial and

I met a grown woman a member of a large family who lived next door. She was a young child, 1 of 10

at the time of Tracy. The entire family sheltered in their Holden station wagon while the house was blown away leaving the concrete piers and steel cross beams. I don't recall seeing them leave but did see rub marks on the piers apparently due to the vehicle being lifted off its wheels and rubbed against the concrete piers. Unfortunately our conversation was cut short by a family emergency she needed a attend to, I had wanted to ask what they did. I surmise that they drove south along the Stuart Highway like so many others in vehicles that would could be driven despite often needing repairs. Once people in various communities along the Highway understood the situation they opened their hearts to provide refreshments, clothing and vehicles repairs. This was typical Australian response and similar for those evacuated by air at every airport.



I was made most welcome at the Anglican Cathedral which itself has had a checkered history both before and after Tracy as well as World War II. The pews are set out as on Christmas Eve 1974. The then Church building was only large enough to accommodate the pews. The stone works including original early 1900s, post WW2 bombing repairs and what was left after Tracy.

The above barely scratches the surface of my experiences during Tracy and at the 50th anniversary celebration.



RE: Village Manly Upcoming Construction Works

Sue Cooke Chief Executive Officer Anglicare Southern Queensland writes: As a part of our ongoing communication, we are writing to advise you of upcoming construction works for the Village Manly, which may impact your access in and around our home and Chapel.

Due to weather, we were unable to complete works as expected in December. As such we anticipate the following works to be undertaken from next week – mid February 2025:

- Erect temporary fencing and timber framed hoarding around Lota House to secure construction zone and access.
 - Current Port Cochere entryway will become part of the construction zone. A temporary covered entry will be created to the left of the current entryway.
 - Access to the toilet via the Chapel will be removed. The toilet to the rear of Lota House will be refurbished for use of visitors to the Chapel.
- Upgrade footpath to the left of the driveway, off Oceana Terrace.
 - Provision has been made in the upper car park for visitors to our home who have limited mobility. We ask that all other visitors utilise street parking.
 - Please be mindful when walking from Oceana Terrace to our home and use the footpath. The driveway will be shared with heavy construction vehicles until a separate construction entrance is created.
 - We acknowledge the importance of visitor parking and recognise the limited options available at this time. Thank you for your patience during the construction period.
- Some trees will be removed to enable various stages of construction to progress. As Village Manly project stages are completed, comprehensive landscaping will be added, as well as a significant number of mature trees maintained, to maximise the lush greenery of our precinct.
- Civil and major construction works are now underway within the Village Manly construction • precinct. All dust and noise impacts will be managed in accordance with Council requirements and restrictions.

Whilst we are excited to deliver this future project, we are mindful of the impact it may have on you.

We will continue to provide project and construction updates to you and ensure that disruptions are kept to a minimum.



The Vicar's Voice

Last week, my brother Chris delivered a box of bits and pieces that had been sent up from Canberra from my second eldest brother Stephen. He has recently downsized after many years. They finally sorted through the shipping container that stored the last of the bits and pieces from our father's shed. As the designated holy weirdo in the family I got some of the pious books and knick knacks he had kept. Some of that was from his time training to be a server and a liturgical assistant... interesting enough in itself and probably indicative of the gentle influence mum and dad had on my faith.

What I found deeply fascinating was some small items of my grandmother's. She was a tiny, very proper English lady by the time I knew her but had let us say an "artistic' youth. I knew about that but only knew a little about her own faith journey . I wasn't aware of the piety behind it... I love the small mementos and prayer pamphlets and some interesting bits from the Sodality of Peter Claver... devoted to the conversion of negro babies in Africa.

Stepping away from the colonialism of it all, I was taken by one small slip of paper.... A receipt for a donation of one pound to be used for the



baptism "of a negro baby to be called Anne", the name of my stillborn aunt ... never really discussed but so obviously held in grief and love.

I cannot imagine the impact on my grandmother and the family at the time... and how that grief was slightly assuaged by that gift. Maybe there is a matriarch in an African family who bore that name... maybe not. But it gives me pause to remember, to pray and to hope that all who hold deep hurts may be heard and healed.

May you be heard this week.
