Community Matters

Robyn and Ailsa take a trip and live to tell the tales.

Ailsa Gill writes: The trip to New Zealand with Robyn was a one down memory lane for me. I

was excited as we approached every destination, trying to find familiar sights from when I was a 20 year backpacker.

First up was Christchurch. When I worked in Christchurch I caught a bus to Cathedral square every day... here's a picture of the cathedral as I remembered it. However, after the earthquake of 2011, the cathedral is now only partially restored, and may not ever progress any further as money has run out. The cost of repairs and restoration after the Christchurch earthquake and in more recent times the earthquake on the Kaikoura coast of the South Island, has been enormous on a country with such small population.

Our trip took us around the South Island of New Zealand and we enjoyed the most amazing scenery. We did have one or two cloudy

days, but mostly the weather was perfect for taking in the most amazing vistas – didn't seem to matter which side of the bus we were seated. I was really looking forward to the visit to Franz Josef glacier. From the pictures you may be able to see that in 1969 the glacier came down to meet the road. Now the glacier has receded a very long way up the valley and it would be a very long hike before you even came to the glacier to commence walking on it.

We also visited Dunedin, Milford Sound, Queenstown, took the Trans Alpine train across Arthurs Pass, toured the beautiful Kaikoura coast and travelled on the interisland ferry from

Picton to Wellington on the one day of that particular week when there was hardly a ripple on Cook Strait (the ferry didn't run for three days prior to our trip because of bad weather).





The North Island also turned on perfect weather, after a wet and cold start in Wellington. The geyser in Rotorua sent up some steam just as we visited, there was bubbling mud all around and the Māori hungi and concert was a real treat.

Our trip included bus and train travel, four wheel drive over one way roads beside very steep cliffs, jet boat ride, a helicopter flight, boat and ferry rides, luge, chair lift, gondolier, golf cart ride, milking a cow, lots of food and lots of laughs (and just a few wool shops).

Robyn Lawler adds: This trip fulfilled my bucket list – to visit New Zealand. Following an introduction to the joys of the Qantas lounge, I took my longest flight ever arriving in wet and cold Christchurch – not terribly inviting. However, from there on it was a great adventure as we travelled around the country enjoying beautiful scenery, great company with our fellow travellers, and also for me, seeing so many places that featured in Lord of the



Rings. I had to keep educating Ailsa on what all these places were and we sat through the Hobbit Movie one evening to bring her up to date.

So a visit to Hobbiton was definitely a highlight. I was able to ride around the Shire on a Golf Cart with my own personal guide, (Hero) – what a great experience. Even had my photo taken outside Bag End, home of Bilbo and Frodo Baggins. Mount Doom (Mt Ngauruhoe) was another special place to see.

I had to make Ailsa cup of tea every morning to get her going so we wouldn't miss the breakfast or the bus. However, she did encourage me to walk a little further



each day and I was able to enjoy some of the little extras that were offered on the tour. This included St Faiths, Rotorua, an historic timber church intricately decorated with Māori carvings.

We are both very thankful for such a wonderful trip and very happy to be back home safely.



Why do we do that:?... Our Children's Space.



St Paul's is a diverse group of men and women with all sorts of backgrounds and gifts... things we rejoice over regularly. One of our deep prayers is that we would have children and young people among us. However, the reality is the group of

children attached to the parish is small, come irregularly but are in no way a lesser part of community.

As an Inclusive church we need to make space for everyone... so we create a child friendly space EVERY week. Ok, most weeks its main role is as a prayer focus... to remind us to hold before God the young people in the broader community and in our lives. But we need to be ready when needed. There is nothing more unwelcoming for a family to arrive and there is a bustle of activity to hurriedly put a few token things out as if they are an after thought or so unusual to cause us a bit of fluster. Having the space ready means the weans and their grown ups can calmly be shown to the space made just for them.

This came home vividly to me two weeks ago. Noah and Millie came to church

with mum Jenny. We were able to lead them straight to their special space and the books and activities were ready for them. I had great fun engaging with them in the sermon... kids say the greatest stuff! What was most profound was inviting them to come with Jenny to stand next to me during the Thanksgiving Prayer. The great foam steps we have out made it simple for them to stand unaided and help and see. Jenny thanked us for making the day so special and now we have a conversation



about Reception to Communion for Noah. None of that would have happened if they were hidden down the back.

So yes... we do it EVERY WEEK in hope and love and as an important aspect of living as an Inclusive church. Children are welcome here!

An Aboriginal Pastor shares on Australia Day.

"There's a heartache still in this land," says Pastor Michael Duckett of the Macarthur Indigenous Church as he shares a message for Australia Day, calling on non-indigenous Australians to remember the mixed feelings in the Aboriginal community about the day.



Speaking in a video titled *The Ministry of Reconciliation, Australia Day 2020,* Pastor Duckett gives a greeting in the indigenous Gumbayggirr language of the North Coast of New South Wales. He said he hopes people will enjoy Australia Day but be sensitive to Aboriginal People.

"Australia Day, what a day!" Pastor Duckett says.
"Today I hope that many of you will be blessed. It's a
great day to celebrate this nation our God's goodness
and His many blessings but at the same time recognise there is a debate in this country about should we
or shouldn't we debate about how aboriginal people
feel."

"So my encouragement is this. Every day is a good gift from God and we should be thankful for every day and we should rejoice in it and be glad for God's blessings fall upon us all who walk on this earth. But also being mindful of the Aboriginal People, as some may view it as Invasion Day, Sorry Day or as a Survival Day where our people struggle to survive in this country, to find justice and to be equal in this country."

The video, available to watch on YouTube is offered by Macarthur Indigenous Church in Sydney's Southwest as a gift and encouragement to the prayers and thinking of churches around Australia. Pastor Duckett ends the video with a plea.

"So as you celebrate this day, I encourage you to rejoice in God's goodness but also to remember those of this land who walked this country for generations upon generations. Many are still struggling to find a place in this nation with the loss of land, of culture and of our children who were taken away. There's a heartache still in this land that we could be mindful of and as Christians, we should be concerned about our brother and our neighbour. So take the time today maybe just to say a prayer. Lift up our people to God, asking him to bring hope and healing, salvation through his son Jesus Christ that he might unite this nation and (that) as a church, we can demonstrate to this nation how to unite in Christ. Have a blessed day!"

At the same time we grieve their mistakes, and any damage they did, while trying to do good.

We thank you that Australia has provided a new start for people from many countries in every generation. We especially praise you that many who arrived with very few resources have been able to find education, training, and employment, and have enriched our common life.

Please give us good government, wise policies, justice and equity, and the ability and wisdom to tackle the major issues of our day. Please rid us of corruption, incompetence, selfishness, greed, inequalities, and self-indulgence. Help us to contribute generously to our neighbouring nations, and to our world.

Please have mercy on all Australians, and teach us to trust in your Son and our Saviour, to love you, and to love our neighbours. May your name be sanctified in Australia, your kingdom come, and your will be done.

The Vicar's Voice

Welcome to the umpteenth week of January. It can seem to drag on forever as the warm wet weeks unfold, the festiveness can seem just a memory and unless you are off to Parkes for the Elvis Festival or Tamworth to indulge in both kinds of music, it can be the long wait for pay day and for things to kick off when the kids go back to school.

This week was the beginning of the warm up with a couple of coffee catch ups, a hospital visit, some pastoral conversations and some planning meetings. It was also good to be able to help Fr Sam out by taking the Wednesday Service at St Peters for him supported by Ailsa and Kay. I am grateful I have time to do those things and still have a few moments for reading, reflection and a late night Zoom session with my Spiritual Director in the United States.

It was interesting to get a perspective from someone living in the States at the moment. Its hard to imagine anyone being unaware of the division in opinion and the difficulty many folk have with the rhetoric and tone of dispute in the USA... and its echoes around the world. Its easy to get despondent at our inability to love our neighbours and just treat each other with dignity and respect... basic human courtesy but also core values for Jesus.

I appreciated the following prayer from Nadia Bolz-Weber shared by Archbishop Jeremy this week.

Dear God.

All I can think to say this morning, is please guide my attention to that which is worthy of it.

When I am overwhelmed by everything that has to get fixed in this broken down world, show me what is MINE to do then please give me the strength to do it and the humility to rest afterwards.

Open my eyes to behold that which is hopeful and lovely and to know that the terrifying and

and lovely and to know that the terrifying and malicious will always be there and that looking away for a moment is not callus, it's calculating. Guide my attention to that which is worthy of it: making art, cooking food, loving people, noticing birds, petting dogs, contacting friends, and doing the work that is mine to do.

And when I am scrolling through meaningless videos, once again wasting more precious moments on this Earth than I realize, snap me out of it, Lord and help me just go for a walk or something. In your holy name, Amen.
